

Each work is grounded in and from place yet branches outward, as a reflection on how we live, exchange and imagine in an era of fragmentation.

You are invited to linger in conversation with the works – to pause, to listen, to question – activating 'here' in your own way. Hobart Current is an innovative longterm partnership between the City of Hobart and the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery (TMAG).

Hobart Current: Here is the third exhibition program in this series, nurturing and showcasing contemporary artists working across multiple artforms.


